The Certificate in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (CELTA) is an initial teacher training course which consists of 200 guided learning hours including 6 hours of teaching practice. It aims to enable candidates to:

- acquire essential subject knowledge and familiarity with the principles of effective teaching
- acquire a range of practical skills for teaching English to adult learners
- demonstrate their ability to apply their learning in a real teaching context.

Candidates who complete the course successfully can work in a variety of English language teaching contexts around the world.

## **Course content**

There are five topic areas:

- Learners and teachers, and the teaching and learning context
- Language analysis and awareness
- 2. Language skills: reading, listening, speaking and writing Planning and resources for different teaching contexts
- 4.
- 5. Developing teaching skills and professionalism

#### **Assessment**

There are two components. Component One: Planning and teaching. Component Two: Classroom-related written assignments.

### **Grades of award**

Candidates who have fulfilled the course requirements and met the assessment criteria receive an overall grade (Pass / Pass B / Pass A).

An individual report which includes details of performance and achievement is produced for each candidate by the centre at which the candidate completed the course.
